#### CIEL and ForestDefender

- CIEL was founded 25 years ago to use the power of the law to protect the environment, promote human rights, and ensure a just and sustainable society.
- Focus on safeguarding communities and ecosystems in the development of REDD+ activities
- One approach: Develop legal tools, such as ForestDefender, and build capacity

### Climate Change, Forests and Rights

- Forests play a role in climate change, protecting biodiversity and in supporting the lives and livelihoods of indigenous peoples and local communities
- But, forests are threatened
- Opportunity in people and in governance
  - Enabling laws and standards to protect the rights of affected communities and avoid illegal deforestation are strong and well-enforced

#### What is REDD+?

- A mechanism that includes forest protection in tackling climate change.
- Reducing emissions from deforestation and forest degradation
- Also includes conservation, sustainable management of forests, and enhancement of forest carbon stocks

#### ForestDefender's Added Value

- Communities and partners in REDD+ countries are provided with tools to evaluate national REDD+ policies against international standards and best practices
- Supports greater consistency between domestic laws and relevant international laws and standards,
- Empowers forest dependent communities to better defend their own rights and their own forests

#### History of ForestDefender

- Ongoing requests to understand if X country has ratified X international legal instrument
  - If so, what rights must be respected
  - If rights are violated, what redress mechanisms are available

#### OVERVIEW

#### Your Go-To-Place

- To find information about a specific country's involvement in REDD+
- To discover what international obligations your country has to its people or extraterritorially
- To build a stronger command of a particular right
- To gain a better understanding of the rights implicated by a specific legal instrument

#### ForestDefender's Audience

- Generally developed for an audience that is already familiar with international legal instruments, such as in-country lawyers and certain activists and community members.
- We are often asked: How do you envision indigenous people and their advocates using this site?
  - To recognize, defend, advocate and enforce internationally-protected rights.
  - Used as a guide to understand how to hold violators of these rights accountable through the various human rights and international financial institution mechanisms.

#### ForestDefender's Compliment

- A community resource guide designed for community leaders that provides an overview of REDD+ relevant rights. It acts as a complement to ForestDefender.
  - Based on a community needs assessment of three indigenous communities in Honduras.
- Moving forward, we will use these tools as part of our advocacy and we expect further dissemination to occur through our partners and networks.

#### ForestDefender is a Database

- Guided Searches
  - By country
  - By instrument
- Custom search
  - By a combination of key terms, countries and instruments of your choosing
- You get to choose how you want to engage with the information as we provide different ways of searching the website.

#### What kind of information?

- Information contained in international legal instruments relevant for forest governance, what rights are implicated by them, and to which major REDD+ countries those instruments apply.
- The countries were chosen based on their participation in key international REDD+ processes.

### Where did we get the information?

- The country-related information comes from the <u>Voluntary</u> REDD+ Database.
- The information on international legal instruments comes directly from the sources: the treaties, declarations and decisions themselves.
- Similarly, the information related to accountability mechanisms and treaty bodies come from each of the official websites for those processes.
- ForestDefender also provide users with the opportunity to search the information using key terms that CIEL has interpreted and tagged.
  - In developing these key terms, we used a "rights-based approach

## Key Terms

Key Term	Brief Description
Access to/Right to Information	tagged when provisions deal with education and training, freedom of information, and in situations where the government has to ensure individuals or communities can understand and interpret process. Both passive and active access to information are tagged
Right to Participate	tagged in provisions that deal with consultation requirements and participation/inclusion in decision-making that affect individuals and/or groups of people.
Right to Self-Determination	tagged for provisions related to a collective peoples' ability to exert control over their land and livelihood, to autonomy and sovereignty related to political status and social, cultural and economic development

- Helpful tips by page
- Reminder that you can share and print your search results
